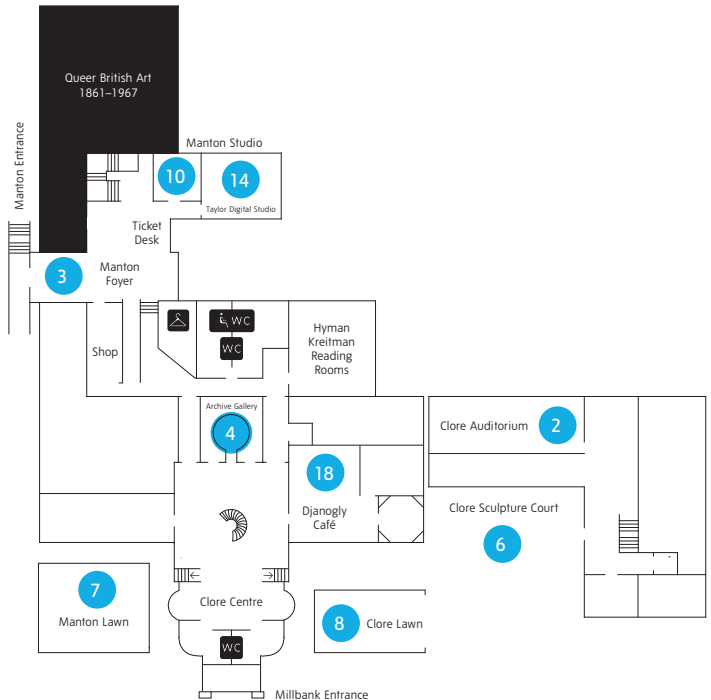

Queer and Now celebrates the powerful role of LGBTQ+ arts, culture and advocacy over the past fifty years. Launching the two-week 2017 Pride in London Festival, this day-long programme of free events welcomes people of all ages and identities to engage in a host of live performances, talks, music, film and dance from artists rooted in the UK's queer community. Responding to Tate Britain's landmark exhibition *Queer British Art, 1861–1967*, Queer and Now brings the conversation around gender, sexuality and identity up to the present and into the future.

With a mixed history, the word queer has been used both as a term of abuse and by LGBTQ+ people to refer to themselves from the end of the 19th century onwards. Queer and Now is inspired by its usage as an inclusive, fluid term for people of different sexualities and gender identities, and as a way of expressing ways of being in the world that don't conform to established norms. Influenced by the vibrant history of LGBTQ+ activism, the festival celebrates community, reflects on progress made and explores the ongoing efforts for queer visibility, recognition and justice.

From family-friendly events, food, craft stalls, drop-in activities for all ages, to one-on-one performance, music and more, this event is for everyone. Delve into theatrical themes from *Queer British Art, 1861–1967* as a family through remixing, music and lip syncing with artist Paul Maheke. Enjoy a special selection of rarely seen films and documentaries from the BFI national archive. Experience intimate and interactive performances courtesy of Brian Lobel's 'Cruising for Art'.

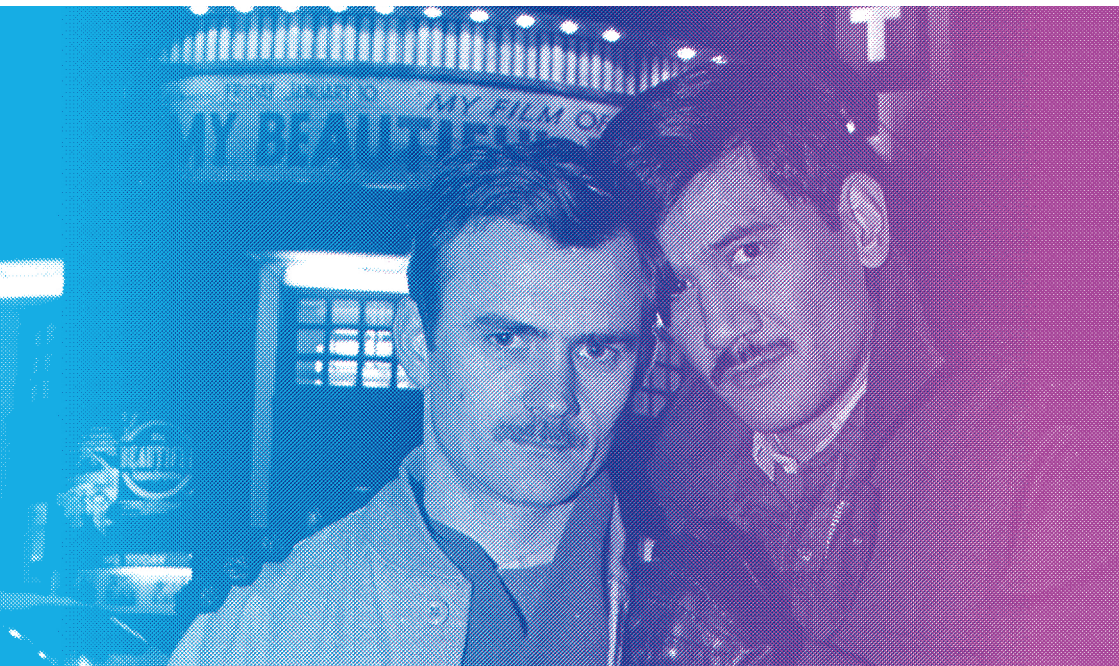

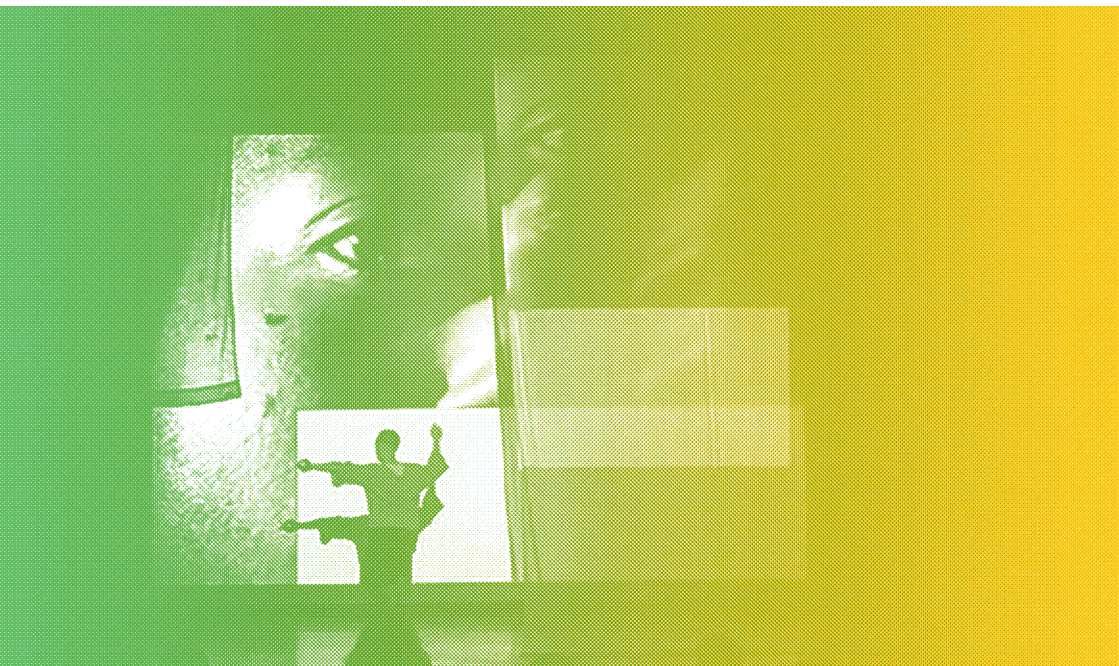

Featuring works from 1861–1967 relating to lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans and queer (LGBTQ) identities, the show marks the 50th anniversary of the partial decriminalisation of male homosexuality in England. Queer British Art explores how artists expressed themselves in a time when established assumptions about gender and sexuality were being questioned and transformed.
